This is The FBN Sidelines Issue! Inspired by a soon-to-be feminist bookseller who called FBN from Spokane saying "I think I know how to get books...but how do I get sidelines? A lot of women here don't (yet!) have the reading habit and I want to have T-shirts and buttons and things to make them feel that this is their store, too!" This issue is an attempt to gather as much information as possible about sidelines for feminist bookstores into one handy place.



Some bookstores carry a lot of sidelines items. In some stores, sidelines make up 30-35% of the total sales, reaching 40+% during December. Sometimes sidelines "are just part of the store," and sometimes they are the difference that keeps the store afloat and the rent paid. Some booksellers pursue sidelines with a passion, and others avoid them whenever possible. Which is almost never. Craftswomen seem to be even more persistent as sales people than self-published poets!

But all in all, there's a place and a need for sidelines. It's important to stock items for women who aren't particularly readers. Literacy is a women's issue, too, and a poster or a button or a t-shirt is a lot more accessible to many women than books. One button, worn in the right situation may be worth a thousand words. Feminist humor is alive and well in buttons and cards, even if still too rare in other forms of print media.

Many women helped make this sidelines issue possible. Particular thanks go to Rose Katz for culling A Room of One's Own's files for names and addresses of sidelines vendors. Also thanks to Marguarite Kotwitz for help with mailing lists, to The San Francisco Women's Building for access to their lists of craftswomen from the Winter Women's Crafts Fairs, the always helpful women of Lesbian Connection and to A Woman's Place in Oakland who let me move into their files, computer and all. And most especially to Lydia Walz of Lizzie Brown Jewelry for mailing lists, much conversation, the idea of doing listings in addition to display advertising and more.

If the Sidelines Issue is as successful all around as it looks like it will be, FBN will do another one next spring. If you think of sideline vendors that aren't included here, please send FBN their addresses and I'll add them to the list for next year.

And please, when you respond to these ads, tell them you saw it in the FBN Sidelines Issue. The women who supported this issue with their advertising dollars deserve to know it works!

Look for more coverage of The Women In Print conference in the next issue. This issue was in lay-out before the ABA/WIP marathon began, so there's only time for a thumbnail sketch of the doings. Women who were there, please take a minute to send in your impressions, responses, and inspirations. And to write up the workshops you gave. The stores who couldn't get there need the information, too.

# ABA & WOMEN IN PRINT

This is a brief, bird's eye view of the ABA & WIP programs in SF this June. More of an impressionistic snap-shot than a report.

For some of us, the Women-In-Print began with setting up booths at ABA, then staffing them for four days of 21,000 people in a hall the size of a city block, doing the networking, connecting, bookselling, contact-making and consciousness raising that can only be done at ABA. FBN was there, sharing booth space with Cleis Press and Seal Press on Gay and Feminist Row, six booths including Alyson Press, Firebrand, new feminist review magazine Belles Lettres, Naiad, Knights Press, Cleis, Seal, FBN, and Spinsters. Kitchen Table Women of Color Press, The



Feminist Press, and the Women-In-Print Exhibition had booths elsewhere on the main floor. Overall, there was a sense that this was a working convention, less flash and carnival energy and more serious booking -- buying, selling, networking, bookseller to publisher feedback -- than at some ABAs. And I can probably count on one hand the publishers I approached who didn't have a reasonable sense of what I meant when I asked about the feminist books on their new list.

Among feminist booksellers, there was a sense of fewer feminist books being published by mainstream publishers. and more books being published by university presses. And a solidly increasing list of books from the small, but not primarily feminist, press. Feminist publishers, of course are publishing more books than ever. While there was concern about the apparent decrease in the number of feminist books being published by mainstream publishers. steadily rising sales figures in all the stores present indicated that this is a perceptual problem on the part of main-stream publishers rather than a reduction of interest in feminist books in the marketplace or a lack good books available to be published. It seems to be that every few years a rumor circulates like a patriarchal flu on publisher's row indicating that the market for feminist books is passe. Usually it slows things down for a season or two, and then evidence to the contrary moves in, and they recover their good sense and go back to more typical publishing patterns. Hopefully the current situation is temporary and recovery will set in soon.

For FBN, it was a convention of distributing advertising rate cards, advertising packets, selling mailing lists to publishers and making advertising contacts. Not to mention getting FBN into the hands of booksellers who need it.

# **CONFERENCE REPORT '85**

The first few days of Women in Print got off to a slow start for those of us who were recovering from the sensory overload and cement floors (read that as fatigue) of ABA. It seemed like such a good idea, a few years ago, to schedule WIP in conjunction with ABA. In practice, few of us who worked the convention would vote for this schedule again. At least one woman was heard the first day of WIP saying "This is the opportunity of a lifetime -- and I'm so exhausted right now that I don't want to talk to anyone I haven't known for at least five years!" But we all plunged in and did the best we could.

Censorship was the primary political topic, workshops and discussions ranging from the effects of the antipornography ordinances being proposed around the country and the English Customs seizure of gay and lesbian books entering England to the disappearance of certain words from our printed vocabularies, to the new sex magazines. Another form of the issue of accessibility and availability? (Look for a write-up in the next issue of FEN.)

The Current Issue and Hot Topic of the conference was Naiad's sale of stories from the lesbian nuns book to Forum. An additional session was scheduled to discuss the question in which Barbara presented as much information as possible and a number of women, including local contributors to the book spoke in response. It was announced that a formal mediation had occurred between the book editors and the publishers had taken place between ABA and WIP, and that several changes had been made in the contract, the details of which would be announced in a joint statement by the editors and publishers at NWSA. Look for a more complete report in the next FBN if the

details haven't already been covered in Off Our Backs and Gay Community News.

Overall, there seemed to be more emphasis on skills sharing workshops than theoretical and political analysis. Missing was a conscious sense of over-view, of purpose and intention that so strongly marked the 1981 WIP. It turns out to be important to gather everyone together and go around the room and have each woman identify herself, her organization, and a sentence or two about what is needed and wanted from this convention and what skills or information she/her organization can offer. It sets the stage for making connections and information and skills sharing. Invites conversations and discussions to continue. This kind of structure greatly empowers a conference. Also missing was the pre-conference organizing

that facilitated a strong women of color presence in 1981. At the 1981 WIP, the announcement of the founding of Kitchen Table, the fundraising, and the strong women of color and working class caucuses all worked to empower the entire conference and the work we were all doing. That spark and passion seemed to be missing from this conference.


One of the things this conference did well was address the issues of accessibility. In addition to being wheel chair accessible, there was also much work done to keep the conference open to women with environmental and other allergy problems by keeping meeting rooms, bathrooms, halls, cafeteria and outside congregating areas smoke and scent free as far as possible. (I never understand the value of having meetings be non-smoking only to be. assaulted by the smoke of all the frustrated smokers the moment one steps into the hallway or bathroom. This conference eliminated that problem by keeping all the essential conference areas smoke-free.) The conference was also drug and alcohol free, in support of women in drug and alcohol related recovery. In addition, meetings of women in 12-Step recovery programs were instigated and held on the spot.

There were 200-250 women registered at the conference, some for only one day, so attendance varied considerably. Twenty-some bookstores were represented ranging in age from soon-to-open to many stores celebrating 10th anniversaries and a few older stores. Income-wise the stores ranged from \$55,000 a year to \$400,000+. I think we were surprised at the financial power the stores represented. We noticed that three women sitting in a row or in a conversation might easily represent a million dollars in store sales. This lead to requests for another financial survey of bookstores. The last survey was in 1981, at which point the total sales in feminist bookstores came to \$4 million. Estimates based on this WIP went as high as \$8 million.

While there were no formal workshops on inventory control systems, we noticed that two of the larger stores (New Words in Cambridge and Sisterhood in Los Angeles) have no card-based inventory systems and order from shelf-lists, memory, and old invoices. Neither store is committed to having "every book in stock at every moment". Neither are the workers in these stores suffering from high-blood pressure, burn-out and stress-syndrome that is common in this movement. Reactions varied from envy to shock. The pragmatic analysis of bookstore inventory systems was that different systems work for different people in different situations.

The bookstores declared informal caucuses and met over meals in addition to workshops, since there was no scheduled time for organization-based caucuses until the last day. These seemed to be as important as the workshops.

Hopefully the next issue will be filled with reports of the bookstore workshops, the participants and facilitators of those workshops willing and writing.... (Hello? This means you, m'dear. Send an outline if you don't have time for an article. It works just as well. Or call and tell it to the FBN answering machine and let your local office worker --me-- transcribe it.)

FBN left the conference with a number of projects: developing a sliding scale subscription fee similar to the ABA membership fee schedule, creating a list of bookstores that is xeroxable to fill the void left by the demise of Moonyean's A Woman's Place Bookstores list, and a financial survey. In effort to more fully cover mainstream and university press books in FBN, we came up with a plan in

which each bookstore would be responsible for writing prepublication blurbs for books from particular publishers based on the publishers' catalogs. Details to be worked out, but you'll be hearing more soon. It would be good to get this system operational in time to include the fall books. Bookstores also agreed to help FBN sell advertising by keeping FBN ad rate cards in stock and passing them on to appropriate sales reps, authors, etc., and to keep subscription forms on hand and to pass them on to customers that they think would like access to the book review/blurb sections of FBN and to tell publishers, etc, that the FBN list of bookstores is available on labels for their publicity and promotions projects and at a very reasonable price. 150 stores for \$25. 50% discount to movement publishers and independent authors. More information on how YOU and YOUR STORE can participate coming soon!

Another idea that was kicked around was that someone (FBN?) should do a set of book blurbs/reviews/puffs that could be used by individual stores as a mailer or counter piece to promote new books. Some stores wanted a ready-togo mailer that was ready to go to the printer as soon as they added their logo and address. Other stores wanted real reviews, to put in their store review magazine. Others wanted something in between with room for their calendar and local advertising.... Eight stores expressed interest, based on their experience that mailers describing new books increased sales significantly and took a lot more time to prepare than they felt they had. Also, unfortunately, more time than FBN has at the moment, but an idea that's in the air. If you have ideas about this project, or want to see it happen, drop me a line or call. It's going to happen only with a lot of demand and more ideas on how to make it work!



# NWT FINAL ISSUES


We are sad to announce that the New Women's Times and The Feminist Review have ceased publication. Off Our Backs, another feminist newsjournal, will be incorporating the last two FRs in future issues beginning in June. The women at OOB have also agreed to send it to all of our subscribers until their subscriptions expire. When your sub ends, we urge you to take out a subscription with OOB, or another of the publications listed at the end of this letter.

At a time when women and feminism are under attack everywhere by the rightwing backlash, we need sisterhood and solidarity more than ever. Our male-supremacist society makes it almost impossible for women to get money, to establish permanent feminist institutions, to keep the history and gains of the past decade from disappearing, to make our voices heard above the neo-fascist clamor, or to call anything our own -- bodies, minds or souls. Or newspapers.

Our task has been make more difficult by several other factors. In addition to two costly lawsuits (one of which challenged our right to our name because the phrase "New Woman" is owned by the male publishers of "New Woman" magazine) we have made managerial and editorial mistakes over the years. Burnout has affected old staff members, and we have found it more and more difficult to recruit longterm, sustaining volunteer help, which, as a not-forprofit organization, has always been essential to our survival. We believe that this is due to the worsening economic situation for women, and to two other factors: first, the large-scale movement of women from feminist activism to peace and anti-nuclear work; and second, the choice of many women to concentrate on personal lifestyles and careers (many made possible by feminist activism) at the expense of their former political commitment -- the socalled "Yuppie" syndrome.

Women must renew feminist identity, community and activism if the hard-won gains of the last 10 years are not to be eroded or obliterated. For example, some college women's groups and women's studies departments are no

longer allowed to identify themselves as "feminist." We happen to believe that feminist is an important word -- that unless we maintain that crucial identity, we run the risk of entering another period of silence, isolation and invisibility, such as that which followed the gaining of the right to vote.




We urge you to continue to grow and to work for women's rights as feminists. Feminism is transforming not only the U.S. but the entire world, but while much has changed much remains to be done. Abortion rights are imperilled; the ERA must be revived; comparable pay for women must be fought for, and all forms of the woman-hating that pervades our society must be challenged and defeated.

Thank you for all your support over the last 10 years of The New Women's Times and almost 7 years of The Feminist Review. In a very real sense, this has been your newspaper.

Crazy Ladies Bookstore

"Do you have any humorous lesbian books?" I asked, and hoped I wasn't asking an impossible or stupid question. Stephanie led me over to a section of the bookstore that was filled with a wide variety of novels, poetry, short stories -- even albums and cassettes.

I had just broken up with my lover of eleven years. I was vulnerable -- just coming back out again, and needed support to laugh again and re-enter life. Crazy Ladies Bookstore seemed like a good place to start, and I wasn't disappointed.

Stephanie, one of two managers of the Bookstore, displays a delightful mix of knowledge of books and a concern for all aspects of the community that the Bookstore tries to serve. She informed me that the Bookstore was started by Caroline. She "burned out," and 20 women who originally formed Crazy Ladies Collective, Inc. bought her out. The Collective uses the dance benefits and other fundraisers to help pay off the debt to Caroline and taxes, as well as to keep the women's community active.

Now the Collective, not co-op, is made up of three women plus two managers who all share the financial, legal, and physical responsibilities of running the Bookstore.

"Crazy Ladies Bookstore's purpose," explains Stephanie, and employee of the Collective, "is to survive and to grow into a viable business. We want to be an alternative bookstore which offers a wide selection of books about and for women, fiction and non-fiction -- not only lesbian and gay men reading choices, albums, cassettes and posters, but also non-sexist, non-racist selections of children's literature."

The Bookstore offers a conducive environment for poetry readings, A.A. meetings, a women's writing workshop, a bulletin board of events and information to and from the community. The Bookstore stocks women's music, pottery, T-shirts, posters, buttons -- you'll even find a free bookmark with each purchase.



# In Memoriam: Sonny Wainwright

Sonny Wainwright died on Thursday, May 9th at Mount Sinai Hospital after a long struggle with cancer. Sonny was a writer, a poet, an educator and a friend. Her strong feminist perspective and her "feisty" style made Sonny a motivating force in all her activities. She was on the steering committees of by the New York Chapter/Feminist Writers Guild and GWA. Her faithful support of Womanbooks, and Karyn London's work there, has helped establish the bookstore as a center for the New York women's community.

Sonny's book, Stage V: A Journal Through Illness, was published last year by Acacia Press. This book chronicles her illness during the winter and spring of 1983, the support and love she received from the women's community as



she began chemotherapy, and the celebration when she went into remission. Her poetry is included in We're Workin. On It, the poetry of the 7 Poets Anthology Collective, published this year.

In her book, Sonny says, "One of my favorite activities, which I consider a service to our community, is making connections between women I like, who I feel will also like and be of help to each other." She will be missed, not only for her activism, but for her strength and courage. She was an inspiration to all of us.

A memorial service will be held on June 9th at 7 PM, at Congregation Beth Simchat Torah, Westbeth. Contributions may be sent to the Feminist Writers Guild or Cancer Care.

Sonny is survived by her daughter Lydia, her parents, Anna and Sam, her sister Edith, her brother-in-law Carl, and by Karyn and her many other friends,

# 2ND INT'L FAIR - OSLO

Oslo 21-27 June 1986

In June 1984 The First International Feminist Book Fair was arranged in London. It was a tremendous success, and during the first two days of the Fair, more than 4500 people visited the various stands in the Covent Garden area. More than 100 publishers from 22 countries presented their books to the public. The Book Fair was followed up by a Book Week with various arrangements and much festivity.

It was to be hoped that the rest of the world would feel an urge to follow up the success in London -- and now two of the employees of the Norwegian University Press have accepted the challenge. With the support of an enthusiastic London office, we have started planning

in Oslo from 21 - 27 June 1986

There is also an advisory committee. The members are from various publishing houses, the universities, research institutions, and the main political parties are also represented.


Just like the arrangement in London, we aim at a feminist book fair with a wide range of books -- fiction and non-fiction. The first two days will be reserved for publishers only, but the remaining days will be open to the public. The Book Week will then open with events related to books, such as exhibitions, bookshops, workshops, debates, seminars, readings by visiting authors, concerts, theatre performances and films -- in Oslo and in other parts of Norway.

We hope to reach all interested groups: authors, translators, publishers, literary agents, journalists, critics, printers, designers, book dealers, librarians --

Bruce is wanting to sell out his part of the store and move to Seattle to practice astrology. We all want to see someone move into that store who can maintain the feminist/gay/alternative atmosphere and stock. (I'd like to see the women's part built up!) Frances will continue to work there. Bruce hasn't had much interest locally (underneath its transient college-town veneer, Athens is fairly "old South") so I thought it would be a good idea to announce it through FBN. Meanwhile, Jerry Sprouse from the Miami men's bookstore reports that their store is open and selling again. Another legal battle won? He also reports that Humpers, Lambda Passages and the Fort Lauderdale bookstores have all faced censorship and legal hassles recently. Are we all talking to each other or is this going on in isolation? Jerry also suggests that someone organize a gay/feminist/alternative bookstore legal defense fund. If each store contributed even \$5/month, it could grow into a useful fund. Unfortunately one that may well be needed.



Did anyone sign up for the Time Magazine Xmas Book Catalogue supplement? For \$139 you get your bookstores name address and phone number listed in your regional edition of the Xmas book insert. Seems like a lot of circulation for the price. Talked to Carole Horne of the Harvard Bookstore at ABA about her experience with the ad last year. She said a number of people responded to the ad, unfortunately many of them wanted the books in the ad, most of which Harvard, as a quality store, wouldn't even think of carrying. Feminist bookstores, especially those with readily identifiable names, might reach would-be customers who don't know the stores exist. And being specialty stores, it might be relatively painless to turn inquiries for the big-bucks books around with some version of "No we don't carry that -- Time didn't feature many feminist books. Why do you suppose that is? But you're welcome to come in and explore our selection of books." I realize that it is June when I'm writing this, far from the maddening reality of the December rush and the phone ringing off the hook. Seriously though, if any one tries this, will you let FBN know how it works for you? Drop me a card now, and I'll call you after the holidays to see how it went. -- C.S.

The London Book Fair last year was excellent exposure for many books produced here in the U.S., books that so many people overseas had never seen. We established several new accounts with stores at the Fair. Also, it was excellent public relations to make the effort to be there, to be visible, to show our commitment to this distribution effort, and to take their organizational efforts seriously by contributing to the event. Some of the publishers we represented last year were Bantam Books; Farrar Strauss & Giroux: The Naiad Press; G. P. Putnam & Sons; Frog in the Well Press -- about ten in all.


This year we have ample time to approach more publishers, to create a magnificent display of the quality, variety and range of women's titles produced in the U.S. and Canada. At the London Book Fair the daily attendance was beyond anyone's expectations. Thousands of individuals, booksellers, publisher representatives, authors and distributors waited in lines to see and buy from the enormous selection of books produced all over the world by, for and about women.

# CLOSED, OPEN & STRUGGLING

In February, FBN sent a "final notice" letter to a number of subscribers who were still on the mailing list but hadn't renewed in over a year, in an attempt to "clean house" on the mailing list. The letter informed stores & subscribers on the delinquent list that they were no longer receiving FBN, it asked if the store had closed, if it was still open, and invited financially troubled stores to subscribe on a sliding scale, but specified that the bottom line was that FBN had to hear SOMETHING from them to get back on the mailing list.

It's sort of a select mail-bag. Some women wrote to say that their stores were alive & struggling along, others were in reorganizing processes, some were closed. So here's the good news and the bad:

Dear Carol & FBN.

Yes, Herland is still here. We don't have any money however. The previous owner, Barbara Cleveland, supported the operation for two years--it became a financial and emotional strain. On January 1 we officially changed our name and established non-profit, incorporated status. We're now collectively managed (with Barbara as a trustee) and in debt (to Barbara) and have very little capital. For instance, our total wholesale stock value is around \$500.

We're working very hard to build up our stock and our first 2 1/2 months we have secured a \$500 6-month loan, the sales on which we have maintained (the rent & bills, contents & liability insurance which we've never had before, a monthly newsletter and coffeehouse).

We're all (of course) volunteers who care about quality of life for women and lesbians in Oklahoma and are making the effort to learn the "business sense" we need to put us in a position to grow. We read FBN and benefit from the information shared. Our next collective meeting is the 17th and I will pass your letter. If the folks think we can send anything, we will. And when we get in a position to actually afford \$35, we will send that. In any case, your financial limitations are well understood -- and we appreciate your efforts to provide a valuable resource for women's bookstores.


I've begun to write you several times. I'm sorry I did not respond nor inform you of 20 Rue's closing. Due to the financial bind we were in, the leaving of collective members, the total burn-out of the only original member (me), I had no choice but to close.

Unfortunately, I also had no choice but to claim bankruptcy. Please know that I made every attempt humanly possible to pay back the woman and lesbian owned businesses who trusted 20 Rue's existence but some only rec'd partial payment. (This hurts my soul.) I struggled (actually "she" -- 20 Rue struggled) in a very conservative, nonsupportive community of Salt Lake City and made some heads turn in this city. We also were there when dozens of women needed someone to come-out to, and with 20 Rue, introduced the political side of Feminism/Lesbianism as opposed to the bar and sex side to many, many women.

I don't regret our existence, only our method of burial.

Please continue to encourage women who "keep-on". FBN was a positive and strong support for us. Thank you and may the goddess bless.



Perhaps it is a book for a more conservative community than mine. The Single Mother's Survival Manual also seemed to be directed at a community more conservative than mine. Aimed at the newly single woman, it undertakes to provide information on more topics (Sex, Parenting, Employment, Budgeting, Cars, Housing, Legalities and more) than can be adequately covered in 180 pages. There seems to be an overwhelming amount of advice on specific situations rather than an emphasis on learning how to make decisions. sometimes seems to be contradictory -- i.e. "You can buy anything on sale if you take the time" doesn't take into account that time is the most limited and precious resource for most single working mothers. Still, it may be a helpful and reassuring book for newly single women suddenly on their own, \$12.95 paper. R & E titles are available at BP and Inland.



# FROM UNIVERSITY PRESSES



Black women's writings have informed my life and expanded my ideas of what was possible. My problem as a reader is that there is never enough of Black women's work in print to satisfy my hunger. Barbara Christian's work eases that hunger a bit by expanding my understanding of the books I've read, and the traditions on which the



writing and the characters are based. I always walk away from her articles wanting to go back and reread the books she discusses knowing there's another book in the book I've read and that I'll be able to understand the books more deeply, standing on the information she's just provided. Which is to say that by adding this book to your shelves of Black women's fiction, and pointing it out to readers, you nearly double the value of the books you have. Minor miracles or feminist mathematics, but an opportunity not to be missed. Christian's most recent work is Black Feminist Criticism: Perspectives on Black Women Writers, \$13.50 paper. \$29.95 cloth. Pergamon Press, Maxwell House, Fairview Park, Elmsford, NY 10523. While you're ordering, you may also want to pick up The Sister Bond: A Feminist View of a Timeless Connection by Toni A. H. McNaron, a collection of essays using true stories of blood sisters as the first step to understanding the nature of sisterhood, to breaking the patriarchal silence about this form of woman-to-woman relationships. Looks at the relationships between Christina Rossetti, Jane Austen, Emily Dickinson, Virginia Woolf, Denise Levertov and Adrienne Rich and their sisters. \$9.95 paper, \$19.50 cloth. If you don't already stock it, you might also pick up Christian's Black Women Novelists: The Development of a Tradition. Not quite as accessible financially, it's \$29.95 from Greenwood Press.

Half Humankind: Contests and Tests of the Controversy about Women in England 1540-1640. What they were saying about women and their rights in the days of Moll Cutpurse. Ten treatises debating the merits of womankind and six eulogies and condemnations depicting actual women, annotated and extensively discussed. \$11.50 paper, \$27.50 cloth. University of Illinois. Also: Daughters of Joy, Sisters of Misery: Prostitutes in the American West, 1865-1890. \$16.95 cloth.



High prices and low discounts, but intriguing: Traditionalism, Nationalism, and Feminist: Women Writers of Quebec looks at the work of lesbian-feminist Marie-Claire Blais and Louky Bersianik, Nicole Brossard, Jovette Marchessault as well as earlier Quebecoise writers including Gabrille Roy, information and work rarely make available in the US. \$35.00 cloth, but perhaps worth the price. The work of Quebecoise feminists, just now beginning to be translated, is one of the important new waves of feminist writing. Greenwood Press, 88 Post Road West, Box 5007, Westport, CT 06881.

Women in the Urban and Industrial Workforce: Southeast and East Asia examines various aspects of women's employment in the countries of Southeast and East Asia. It also looks at migrant women and their adaptation to urban employment and women's roles in the workforce and their relationships with their families. Articles range from those based on census data to case studies of projects aimed at improving working women's conditions. \$19.50 paper. Text discount. Published by the Australian National University, distributed by the University of Hawaii Press.

In case you hadn't noticed, the Bible is consistently derogatory, condescending, patronizing and insulting in its attitude toward women. Sex, Ideology and Religion: The Representation of Women in the Bible by Kevin Harris documents all that. \$22.50 cloth. Then again, there's Feminist Interpretation of the Bible edited by Letty M. Russell looking at everything from the emergence of Black feminist consciousness to feminist uses of Biblical materials to explorations of pornography and wife battering. \$10.95 paper. 
