WE SOUND LIKE THIS

We Sound Like This is a newly formed Black Lesbian band presently gracing Bay Area stages. Their first public appearance was on Lesbian and Gay Freedom Day in June of 1982. However, their official debut was August 13, 1982 in Radcliffe Hall (Ollies) where they "wowed" a small, but attentive audience.

Their style keeps with the tradition of all types of Black music, incorporating, blues, jazz, funk, rhythm and blues and folk. The versatility of the individual members is impressive and general musical excellence seems to be the prevailing goal.

Anna Maria Flechero, pianist/vocalist, plays with a searing gut force that reflects total absorption in her musical expression. Her potency is exhibited by rich deep chords on the piano, grooving body jestures and a full, resounding voice.



Dee Harris, the bass guitarist, gives a center stage performance through her "funk machine" and spontaneous dance. Her smile was very warm and my enjoyment was heightened just knowing that she was having fun.

Cookie, the percussionist, presented a balanced image of intensity and control.
Her "licks" were well timed,
tasteful and properly proportioned. I did find myself,
however, longing to hear more
percussion and hoping that she
would take a more prominent
role in the future.

The drummer, Yolanda Bush, proved herself to be one of the most talented musicians in the group. Besides traps, Bush also did a solo spot with guitar and vocals that tickled, tantalized and soothed. I felt as though she had invited me into her living room for a talk over a bottle of wine. Her basic rhythmic nature, was not only displayed on the drums but was also demonstrated by a light teasing scat during her solo.

The overall performance of the group was spotty. "Your Basic Space Cadet," written by Flechero, was very strong and powerful, while other tunes suffered from poor arrangements and inconsistency. Two old favorites, however, made their appearance under new names and expansive orchestrations. These were: Summertime, newly named Calypso Woman and incorporating a gospel chorus; and Song For My Father, renamed Song To My Lady and using varying musical modes.

I hope that we hear more from We Sound Like This and encourage the community to give this new group abundant support. See Announcements section of the Newsletter for October performance dates.
