Welcome to FBN's Tenth(!) Annual Sidelines issue. We produced our first Sidelines Issue in 1985 to answer the question booksellers asked FBN most frequently: "Where can I get sidelines to sell in my store?" Since we were spending so much time on the phone answering this question, we decided to write it all down and publish it as a special issue of FBN.

Booksellers used the information to order holiday stock and kept the issue handy to use during the rest of the year as well. It worked so well that we did it again — and again and again!

The world of feminist bookstore sidelines has changed a good deal over ten years. Albums have disappeared, CDs and videos are in. Buttons still sell to the crunchy-granola generation while the next generation eschews buttons for day-glo stickers. Safe sex paraphernalia is de rigueur and, even through there are many more "safe" environments for women who want to buy vibrators, there are still towns where the women's bookstore is the only safe place to go.

The bookselling world has changed a bit over ten years, too. Predatory superstores committed to competing with feminist and other independent bookstores were a nightmare yet undreamed when we did the first sidelines issue. (See Chain, Chain, Chain, page 19.) Sidelines have become increasingly important to feminist bookstores as a way to emphasize the ways we are unique and special to our communities — and to provide our community with things the chains and superstores can't and won't carry.

This special issue also compiles the experience of three different feminist bookstores in their successes at providing safer sex information and paraphernalia. It suggests fusion marketing as a way to increase both jewelry and book sales, discusses renting audio tapes, looks at new trends in "women's music" and, last but not least, initiates FBN's first regular video review column. And, of course, the sidelines ads and listings make up the heart of the issue. Our thanks to everyone who contributed faves and raves, ideas, information, articles and ads to this issue. It takes all of us to make this community.

So enjoy it! And please remember to tell our advertisers that you saw it in FBN.



This year, my hands down favorite sideline is women's music. When I first started working at L'Androgyne two years ago, the few cassettes that we had were a complete mystery to me. But after my inaugural trip to Michigan last summer, and after two years of scrutinizing Goldenrod catalogues and consulting with the priceless Cathy Andrews (Goddess of Music, she is!) our music section is easi-

ly twice its original size, and everything moves!

If you're remotely hesitant about the viability of a music section, talk to the women at Goldenrod — they really know their stuff. Ask for promos. Play your music in the store and watch how many people ask you what you're playing. Read *Hot Wire, Deneuve* — keep on top of new releases and who's coming to town. Know your music — women really appreciate your opinion.




Fusion Marketing

Every Piece Tells a Story

A feminist bookstore is always more than a bookstore. It's a source of inspiration and a meeting place for like minds. Unfortunately, feminist bookstores often operate with little cash flow. Many independent bookstores have faded away over the last ten years and are being upstaged by the "superstores." Knowing how to fuse seemingly dissimilar products and how to keep the romance of bookstores alive is now a marketing strategy worth noting. Imagination and creative marketing are of crucial importance. Offering a good product for a fair price is no longer a ticket to success.

My bookstore carries the usual feminist bookstore assortment of cards, music, journals, wrapping paper, candles and the like. One of our favorite challenges is to find products in the store that have connections. Customers particularly appreciate our efforts in this direction when they are trying to put together gifts. The tarot cards are grouped with angel cards and books on divination. If your store sells pendulums, grouping them with information and books on divination is helpful. Estes' Women Who Run With the Wolves (Ballantine) was a big seller here, as everywhere, and we have a pin done by Gina Certa of a howling wolf that customers loved.




From left to right: Earth Healer, Goddess Primordiac and Receptivity. Sculpture by Jane Sipe

When a customer is uncertain as to the origin or meaning behind jewelry pieces, such as the labrys, I walk her over to Barbara Walker's *Dictionary of Symbols and Sacred Objects* (HarperSF) to show her a written description of the history of the piece. This usually sells the book as well.

An unusual line of jewelry from Jane Iris Designs gave me the original idea about fusing. One rainy Sunday I waited on a woman who wanted a ring for her best friend, a friend who had gone to hell and back. I had a ring in the case patterned after the story of Demeter and Persephone. By the time I was finished telling her the story, I had sold a very happy customer the ring and two books written on Goddess culture - and I had found a new source of connection between the Jane Iris Jewelry and hundreds of books from Gimbutas to Budapest. There are many types of books available. One of my favorites to use in connection with the jewelry is The Storyteller's Goddess (HarperSF) by Carolyn McVicar Edwards. The stories are vividly written and full of color and life. The Kuan Yin story in Edwards' book ties in with Iris' Kuan Yin piece. Jean Shinoda Bolen's Goddesses in Everywoman (Harper) shows readers how to identify their ruling goddesses and includes a basic "who's who in Greek mythology."

The Jane Iris pieces are dramatic and come with story cards telling the story. The prices are slightly higher than some of the other lines we carry, but the quality is so obviously superior that I don't get many

objections. The real fun is being able to show how every piece tells a story and help a customer create a meaningful combination of symbol and myth.

Customers are interested in hearing the stories behind these pieces. Display the books with the jewelry in the jewelry case. If there isn't room in your jewelry case for jewelry and books, make up some cards that tell customers where the stories can be found.



Let's face it. The jewelry is more profitable than the books. The books are why we are here in the first place, but it helps to find some creative ways to hang on in the age of "superstores." Marketing the jewelry so that you can increase your overall profit is going to help you down the road. Customers seem to love finding something exotic and beautiful that they will never find in their local department store. Selling a few extra books won't hurt, either. This is fusion marketing: grouping seemingly unrelated products to increase the salability of both. It requires just a little planning, a little enthusiasm and gets some great results.

Taking Care of Business

Renting Audio Tapes

Inspired by two women in my reading group who travel a lengthy distance to work each day and had been complaining about the lack of new audio tape titles at the local library, I began thinking about renting audio tapes.

About the same time, one of my sales reps was leaning on me to consider carrying audio. He referred me to the article in *PW* (sometime in late '93 or early '94), which talked about selling and renting audio tapes. I decided to take the plunge, since video rentals do so well.

Here's what I did: I purchased 5 tapes to start with. Wouldn't Take Nothing For My Journey Now by Maya Angelou, Robber Bride by Margaret Atwood, Fire with Fire by Naomi Wolf, Wild Woman Archetype by Clarissa Pinkola Estés and Lasher by Anne Rice. The tapes are in a brightly decorated box on top of our video display case.

Our last newsletter had an article about all of our rentals — video and audio. The article also noted that on Thursday and Friday evenings, when we're open until 8pm, we play audio tapes in the store. So far no one has come running in just to hear the tapes, but my employee and I thoroughly enjoy listening. Everyone's hands down favorite so far is Wouldn't Take Nothing For My Journey Now. Lasher has not yet been rented.

Currently I ask for a \$10 deposit, check or cash which we put in an envelope until the tape is returned. The rental fee is \$3.50 plus tax for an amount of time we agree upon with each individual customer.

I feel strongly that the rental time should be worked out on an individual basis since people use

audio tapes very differently than video tapes. Some want one or two tapes for a weekend car trip; others want one tape for a week to ten days to listen to while they do household chores or cook. So far everyone has honored the agreed-upon return date.

As for bookkeeping, we have a notebook with one audio title per page. On the appropriate page, we record the person's name, address, phone number, date out, agreed-upon return date, and a note about the deposit.



If audio rentals become a big thing, we will move to doing them in the same way we do video rentals (i.e., with a membership, thus eliminating deposits, a card system for each member, and a master list for tracking rentals) and charge less for those with membership.

After about six weeks, audio rentals work nicely. Since most audios are purchased at 50% (in the \$6-\$11 range), 2 to 3 1/2 rentals pay for the tapes. If the rentals fall off too drastically, I'll put the audio tapes in our used book section and sell them for a buck or two.

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

More and more feminist bookstores are beginning to sell safe sex products and sex toys for women. A recent report by the San Francisco Department of Public Health found that among 405 lesbian and bisexual women surveyed a high number of women reported having unsafe sex with female and male partners. In addition, "among those reporting a history of sex with women, 91.1% reported a history of unprotected oral sex, 28.8% reported unprotected sharing of sex toys and 25.2% reported unprotected vaginal fisting during the past three years." Clearly, the combination of women (aged 17 and up) having unprotected sex with both men and women demonstrates a potential danger. Feminist bookstores are responding to this potential crisis by being responsible progressive people in the community and stimulating the discourse about safe sex among both lesbians and straight women by providing safe sex products and selling safe sex toys. In this article Kasha Songer (Book Garden), Jane Brooke (Lammas Books & More), and Jo derBoer (Amazon Books) provide valuable information from their experiences selling safe sex products and sex toys for women.

"Selling safe sex/sex toys is one of those very rewarding areas of our store," says Kasha. "Lots of women ask about safe sex and we help get them started. Lots of women ask about sex in general. There aren't many safe places to go and ask questions or buy toys or discuss erotica. The more women enjoying healthy, happy sex lives, the better." Of course, easing sex products into your store can be difficult. Because women have historically been omitted from the sex discussions, some cus-

tomers (and employees) may initially be embarrassed by this new phenomenon at their local women's bookstore.

Jane Brooke admits "I shrieked and giggled the first time I saw a dildo at Lammas. After I'd poked it and squeezed it and waved it around, however, it became quite friendly and stopped embarrassing me. Then, I could show dildoes and sell them with pride!"

She says the customers at Lammas fall into one of three camps: "those who react like I did and can't wait to get their hands on a dildo; those who know exactly what they want and how to get it; and lastly, those who have a dildo blind spot and won't look at them even when they're standing right in front of one." Jane has been expecting an occasional upset customer who objects to the store having sex toys and erotic videos on display but she hasn't detected one yet.

"Amazon just started selling safe sex gear, lubes, and vibrators eight months ago," writes Jo. "We have always carried the dependable Wundere Prelude [vibrator]. Now we also carry the Hitachi Magic Wand." She is currently looking into more vibrators.

Although Amazon is obviously easing into this product line Jo says "Our process in deciding to

carry these products wasn't without humor and some painful discussions. After several lengthy staff meetings with the staff divided in 'for' and 'against' camps, we decided to form a committee. This committee includes myself (I'm one of the managers) and two of the younger part-time women. We call ourselves the Dildo Committee. The first thing we did was call Good Vibrations in San Francisco (415-974-8990) and bought their wholesale list for \$50. Jenny and Susan wrote or called every one of those businesses and requested catalogs. The fun began when we sat down at lots of breakfast meetings, scoping out the catalogs and samples. We giggled, talked girl-talk and discussed the staff's concerns: how to display products, what products to start with and how far to go (no pun intended). We decided to start slow - safe sex products, two new vibrators and different kinds of lubes and dildoes."

When Amazon first started carrying dental dams they bought in bulk from a local supportive dentist and packaged them in the store. Jenny packaged three to a Ziplock bag and included a fun, sexy fortune in each package. They had a lot of fun writing the fortunes. But, now they carry prepackaged dams from Lick the Crisis Inc., a woman owned company. The packaging is more attractive.

Details on Dams

Many of the booksellers I've talked with described difficulties in finding quality dams, so here are two woman-owned companies that are committed to promoting safer sex among women.

Amazon orders from Prinny Alavi at Lick the Crisis, Inc. in New York City. She sells finger condoms (\$.65) called "Rub-Her With Pleasure;" dams (\$1.50), "Dam-Her With Pleasure;" and latex gloves (\$.75), "Glove-Her With Pleasure." In all packaging there is information on how to use the product and information on how to start talking about safer sex. The dams and gloves come in various flavors and scents such as chocolate mint. Prinny also has a line of buttons, one of the most popular reads "Safer Sex Slut and Proud Of It." They wholesale at \$1.50 and are handmade. The other product that does well for Prinny is the "Her Erection" poster that shows that "women get erections, too." This poster is definitely for the bold, out store. It portrays four clitorides

(plural for clitoris) erect, without showing the "male pleasure canal." Wholesales at \$8. Poster is 14" X 20".

Eros Veils Self-Supportive Dams is an exciting new company owned by a young African American woman. Eros Veils makes "body friendly" dams that stay in place "so the hands can be better occupied by the user." Tracey Williams, who owns the company, says that 1 in 7 people are allergic to latex which is why her manufacturer makes her dams out of "kitchen wrap." Community based AIDS organizations recommend that lesbian women who engage in oral sex cut condoms or use double layers of kitchen wrap as an alternative to latex dams. So, Tracey had her manufacturer use double layers, too. The plastic she uses sticks to the body, but not to itself. Amazing! And because they are really made of plastic kitchen wrap, the material in these dams is FDA approved. Among Eros Veils' current clientele is the Black Coalition on AIDS, Lyon Martin Women's Health Clinic (both in SF) and the Oregon Department of Health. The dams are scentless and tasteless and come in four different styles:

- Rectangle (8 x 8 inches)
- Hourglass (8 x 13 inches) place over anal and vaginal areas.
- Mask (8 x 13 inches) insert both your ears entirely through ear slots and position the mask a half inch in front of nose, then run the mask against the under-chin.
- Cinch Brief an adjustable pair of plastic safe sex underwear.


All products come in opaque black or clear. There is no minimum order. To accommodate different budgets stores can buy dams in bulk (non-prepacked) or individually packaged which makes for a \$.20 difference in price per unit. The pre-packaged dams range from \$.30 to \$.80 per unit depending on style. Tracey Williams, Eros Veils: Self Supporting Oral Sex Veils, 533 14th St., San Francisco CA 94103; 415-552-3535.

Resources From Book Garden

Battery operated vibrators. We stock both slender and regular. They come it mint green, purple, white, gold, red and black. White is always a must for those too shy to buy a bold color; purple is always a fave for the more outgoing; and red is in at Christmas and Valentine's Day. The Pearl Diver, the

Ultimate Beaver and the Jack Rabbit are dual motor vibes that rotate and vibrate. They are *very* popular.

Our long time distributor has just folded, so we are exploring two new distributors right now. Pipe Dream carries the Swedish Erotica line. Pipe Dream's telephone number is 800-426-5030. Our sales rep's name is Honey. We are also trying New Beginnings (818-837-7722 or 800-722-8797). They have the most comprehensive collection of catalogs I've seen in awhile, though it took two calls to get a set of catalogs. Ask for Ken Dorfsman or Jim Woolhouse.



From the The Good Vibrations Guide To Sex.

Electric Vibes. (Prelude III and imitations, Hitachi Magic Wands and imitations and electric rechargeables.) Ah! The ever elusive Hitachi Wand. The distributors we find keep going out of business. Hitachi Corp. has been flat out rude about selling to us direct since we don't order \$1000 at a time. Their reps don't bother to return our calls. (See Amazon.) We are now trying another local rep, Sales Associates at 303-936-9639.

Silicone Dildoes. About 20 different models and five colors, offering a variety of physical and emotional sensations from tame to tough and from funny to serious. They include Blue Moon, Green Zucchini and Cucumber — in gray or blue, multicolored goddesses Bea and Lilith and many many more. Add cloth sashes to tie the dildoes on (they work like harnesses).

Trilby Boone runs Dils for Does. Buying from Trilby requires great patience but it's worth the wait. Her toys are the best. She is a bit of a phone phobe. Our average wait is 4 months. Trust me on this one. It's worth it. Her new phone/fax number is 707-542-9912. If you want to send her mail it should be sent to Good Vibrations, 938 Howard St., San Francisco CA 94103.

Gloves, Condoms, Lubes. We've gotten into these in the last year. They aren't fast sellers, but we all know how important it is to stock them.

Mayer Laboratories is our supplier (231 Fallon St., Oakland CA 94607; 800-426-6366 or 510-452-5555). Ask for a local rep. I don't know if it's the whole company or just our rep, but what a treasure! They have tastefully packaged lubes, condoms, gloves and coming soon... dams in a mask. The mask works like a dam but it ties on your face like a bandanna. They consulted lesbians on the design. This is not on the market yet, but should be ready soon. This company is queer-friendly and concerned about women's health. They have a good newsletter that just informed me that they will soon carry "Duron" polyurethane condoms imported from Great Britain. This will be good news to those allergic to latex. And they predict plastic condoms soon.

Dams. We don't have them. We can't settle on a distributor we like.

Free Safe Sex Kits. Colorado AIDS project supplied these until they decided it was too expensive. Interesting how the free condoms all around town for men aren't too expensive, but the kits for women are...

Leather, restraints and other toys like that would scare our tame customers if we put them on display. They are available only by asking to look at our catalog in the office. It's much more likely, however, that we would just refer the customer to the sex stores in town.

— Ideas From Dam Distributors —

- Display dams and condoms behind the counter or where you can see them. One gay/lesbian bookstore reports selling 10 dams in one week and in the same week having 10 stolen.
- Have samples on the counter for customers to touch and get a feel for.
- Have an erotic poetry reading and give out samples of dams or lubes.
- Post a sign next to the erotic literature section that reads "We Carry Safer Sex Materials."

Demo Basket. A basket full of working vibes that always gets a group laughing and lets them hear and feel the vibes. We also have a basket of free lube samples. It has made them sell better.

Dildoes. Our dildoes are all woman-friendly designs: diving women, dolphins and bananas are favorites. They come from Dils for Does, the best and least expensive company I've found. Each one costs us between \$15-\$25. I have a poor quality black and white catalog which shows the general idea of the designs. The minimum order is \$200 and payment is COD (at no extra charge) or prepayment. I'm trying to persuade Trilby Boone, the company's owner, to do terms. I'm sure more businesses would try her products if they could be billed net 30. There is a 2-4 week turnaround, longer for specially mixed swirly colors. Dils for Does telephone and fax is 707-542-9912. Trilby has never yet answered the phone, but she does return calls. The dildoes are very popular and are a great novelty item to have in our store. We're on our fourth order in six months.

Harnesses. To complement the dildoes we sell Rainy Day synthetic harnesses from Stormy Leather (women owned and operated). Call them at 800-486-9650. Stormy women are wonderful to work with, very friendly, knowledgeable and helpful. The harnesses I get cost \$13.50 (Malibou 2 strap). Nobody seems to want the leather harnesses I've tried. The minimum order is \$50 and terms can be arranged. The catalog is a work of art and even the packaging is classy.

Lubes. We also sell lubricants. Astroglide is the most popular. Our supplier is Choice Supply (800-368-3708). They have no minimum and Astroglide costs \$4.23 per bottle. We also sell cheap condoms and are trying to get better dams.

But Can She Type?

CHAIN, CHAIN, CHAIN ...

I live in a rural area. My nearest small town downtown is threatened by the influx of supershopping brought to us by Wal-Mart. Some of us shopping-resistors will not venture inside this stadium. Knowing how few small town merchants survive this "competition" we watch as the hardware, the pharmacy and the convenience store unstock... The farm supply store has added some glitzy plastic to try to keep up appearances, but the familiar knots of neighbors sharing news and how-to has disappeared from the aisles.

Shopping here used to be driven by need, not this vague "I need to buy something — what do you have?" impulse that drives the commercialism of the mall— and the super-store. When shopping was driven by need, variety, price and instant gratification were secondary to the greater convenience of having these goods available locally. Our stores did not make community but, as gathering places and focal points in our community, they became resources for community-making.

Thus my understanding of the threat to the feminist bookstores from the superstore invasion runs parallel to my rural community experience. The tactic is the same: move into a niche market that has been defined and refined by its own community and undersell them at all costs. If you own a thousand stores, it's easy.


The response of community retailers is predictable: handwringing, appealing to the community for support, changing inventory to reflect the appeal of the big stores. We don't know yet whether small towns will survive Wal-Mart or how the feminist stores will survive Barnes and Noble. We do know that retailing has changed in the twen-

ty years since feminist bookstores began to appear. The imperialist tactics U.S. companies formerly reserved for the "developing" countries is now being deployed on vulnerable markets at home.

Neither negativism nor the fortress mentality is useful to us in the long haul. Things change. But I want to be sure the changes I make accord more fully with my politics rather than less. Some thoughts:

There is a great need for the work of feminist bookstores. In defining our politic we will sustain ourselves and resource the movement ...

- A community is not a market. A self-defined community has places for gathering and exchange which define the services needed, not vice versa. The marketeers who look to our communities as "markets" may determine what is available commercially but they will not define the community. It is disrespectful to approach our own community as a market.
- A community is not built commercially. It is an organic thing. Its focus and cohesion are shared politics, commitments and history, even though not all aspects of these are ever shared. If you have core political beliefs, you have a movement. If you do not, you have a market.
- Feminist and rural communities have been de-centered. Over half of this rural community now



drives to work in the city or new superemployment manufacturing/retail ventures. Those who commute lose many of the distinctions that comprise "rural." So, too, the community served by feminist bookstores is no longer composed only of feminist activists. It now includes women with mainstream employment and lifestyles who have feminist interests and values. For these women, the bookstore is one of the points of greatest contact with feminism rather than a place where active feminists gather to purchase tools for their work. When my neighbors quit farming they don't hang out at the farm supply store as much. The farm supply store and the bookstore are still places of shared culture, but are no longer sources of essential tools for many of the people in their communities.

A community is not a market ... It is not built commercially. It is an organic thing.

- Feminist bookstores all by themselves cannot constitute or reconstitute the feminist movement. Women's liberation is still in need of activism. Although there is some acceptance of feminist insights, violence and economic injustice still keep women down. When our feminist communities are centered in activism, our feminist bookstores thrive as cultural centers.
- You can't build a community from a market approach. You can only build community and then resource that community. The task is not to see how much of the community's dollar can be spent at feminist bookstores, but to bring the books, the issues, to the community. Schlepping books to events and centering feminist concerns and resources is where you meet the audience. Holding forums, book groups, discussions, author readings creates community.
- That there are many more titles than ever before does not mean there is more choice. I think of my only trip to an Office Max where 250 feet of shelf space was devoted to 3-ring binders, all alike except for two widths in six colors. Granted, not all



feminist books are "keepers," but some need to be read and read again. The issues are still with us: how do we keep feminist books available for more than a quick shelf-life?

• The entry of the chainstores into our forcefield is another development of the entry of the mainstream as publishers and distributors. Feminism is not a mainstream politic in patriarchy. Emulation of our feminist work by mainstream has too often



been misconstrued as recognition. Some in our community have been enthralled by the sleekness of these commercial machines and the illusion that this is what women deserve. But we deserve more than that. We deserve liberation.

I cannot afford to let my local hardware store go down because no chain* store is going to stock the replacement parts to a pump sold widely in this area in the '60s or seed that is hardy in this region. In a like manner, feminists cannot afford to have their feminist bookstores suffer because feminist bookstores will stock a small press book only ten women will buy and keep in stock a twelve-year-old title that is still the best resource on the topic. Appeals to guilt will not keep a store vital. Women are going to spend money in bookstores that actually resource our lives.

I firmly believe that the values of my rural community deserve preservation and that many of the old methods that are the most sustainable will resurface as "new" ideas. I believe there is a great need for the work of feminist bookstores and that in defining our politic we will sustain ourselves and resource the movement... Just more chains to be broken, I guess.

Sacramento, Calif. -- This summer, First Blush Cards added yet more diverse images to the line of greeting cards Joan Greenfield started in 1990, including more women of color and differing body shapes. When Greenfield first began, she wanted to broaden the image of lesbians in the medium to include as diverse a group of women as possible but only a few of her friends were willing to model.

As the cards appeared in shops across the country and word of the model search spread, however, more women -- and women of color -- volunteered. And for the first time, women whose body shapes aren't the starved (or buffed) advertising norm also agreed to be on the cards.

"Lesbians are not only diverse in our looks and lifestyles but also in our approach to life," said Greenfield. "I always wanted to show lesbians in all our diversity as well as our glory because I want my cards to speak to all lesbians. I've tried to use many different women to do that."

The 49 year old photographer also added color this time around to a line that first made its mark with stylized black-and- white photo images. First Blush now has 27 year-round cards, a birthday, anniversary and two Christmas images. Plans are also in the works for a calendar.

Articles about First Blush Cards and Greenfield have appeared in most major Gay/ Lesbian newspapers and magazines, and on the cover of the life section of USA Today.

Well Sexy Women: A Lesbian Woman's Guide to Safer Sex is a British documentary that offers candid discussion between lesbians about safer sex. The film is unique in that the British perspective on AIDS and STD prevention differs slightly from the dominant American one. The point is made that the American trend is towards "completely safe sex," while the British attempt is to make sex "safer": they recognize that the only truly "safe sex" is no sex. Well Sexy Women is indeed a valiant attempt at presenting the facts. The atmosphere in the film is casual as several women sit in what appears to be someone's house discussing, questioning, and telling their own stories. The filmmakers intercept the safe sex talk with scenes of lesbian women engaging in sexual activities from fisting to oral sex with a dam. The label on the box warns that the program contains "sexually explicit scenes, including graphic demonstrations of lesbian sex and female nudity." The film succeeds in its goal to show how safe sex between women can be erotic. Unrated. 50 minutes. When Abortion Was Illegal: Untold Stories is one of the most moving accounts of the pre-Roe v. Wade era I've ever seen. Producer/director Dorothy Fadiman documents how the illegality of abortion affected the mental and physical wellbeing of everyday women. Fadiman, however, does not present the topic as if it existed in a vacuum. The power of her film lies in the fact that she documents abortion as a symptom of this society's animosity towards and hatred of women in general. Several women tell their harrowing tales as they ventured into the unknown and illegal world of abortion. She is a favorite at women's music festivals, cruises, conferences, community dances and gay/lesbian clubs across the country." I'm not really a country-western girl, myself, but I did stand in front of my television screen and attempt to follow Donna E.'s easy step-by-step dance instructions. On their first album, sisters Hanitra and Noro teamed with long-time members Sammy and Tiana. The focus was on traditional songs and Sammy and Tiana's accumulated repertoire from the past. Frances Black & Kieran Goss/Frances Black & Kieran Goss. Familiar to many as Mary Black's sister, Frances Black has toured the U.S. repeatedly as lead singer with the acclaimed Arcady Band. Her appearance on the *A Woman's Heart* compilation has brought her even wider attention. Kieran Goss is one of the most expressive singers on the folk scene. His voice is in the same range and style as Vance Gilbert or James Keelaghan. Songs include "Wall of Tears" (heard on *A Woman's Heart*), several written by Goss, and others by Karla Bonoff, Joan Armatrading, and contemporary Irish songwriters. Were You At The Rock.../Aine Minogue. Aine Minogue (pronounced on-ya min-og) is an extraordinary talent. She amply demonstrates that, in the hands of a master, the harp can be amazingly versatile. There are very old tunes, selections from the harp's renaissance period, and also the finest of contemporary material. Passage To New England/Pendragon. Combining its love of the music of Ireland and England with original compositions drawn from New England's mill and textile traditions, this band has produced an album of astonishing grace and flair. 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New Trends

A Different Kind of Women's Music

In most retail ventures, trying to stay just ahead of the leading edge of new waves of customer demand is an ongoing process. Given that there are trends even within trends, and that each product line is likely to be on a different cycle, buyers have their hands full. Music is often one of the biggest sidelines for women's bookstores, and the trends that appear are often tied to general trends in contemporary music.

There are two current trends gaining momentum: the emergence of "alternative rock" as a genre that is marketable in women's bookstores, and the poetry and spoken-word tapes that are growing out of the poetry-slam rage.

Alternative Rock

Alternative rock is not something new in and of itself. Punk, grunge, thrash and other variations have been around for awhile. Bands like Nirvana, Concrete Blond, and Smashing Pumpkins have been out there ripping up the airwaves and concert halls. What is new is that there are more bands made up primarily of women or with female lead vocalists, and more lesbian groups. There is now a body of alternative rock music that women's bookstores can carry. Fans are primarily, though by no means exclusively, young.

As this new trend continues to develop, I am try-

ing to teach myself more about it. If you are not familiar with alternative rock, there are a number of things you can do. If there's a college radio station in your town, tune in from time to time. If this isn't your favorite kind of music, you probably won't listen continually, but it's a good idea to give yourself a chance to get a feel for it. Some contains more screeching and wailing than my taste allows, some is melodic, some is atmospheric and odd. Check out the



latest issues of *Rolling Stone* magazine. Alternative music gets a lot of space, including interviews with performers, and reviews of shows and albums. *Denueve* generally has well-written, women- and lesbian-oriented reviews in just about every issue.

In many cases, a teenaged or twenty-something staff member may be very up to date on what's hot. Perhaps the customer who is always asking you for the new titles by The Breeders or Bikini Kill can

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make some suggestions, too. Your distributor can tell you what seems to be selling for stores of your size, type or geographic region. As with most types of music, you don't necessarily need to love it in order to help customers find what they're looking for.

For the most part, this is a process of appealing to a different crowd than you might be used to. Some of the usual marketing practices may not apply here. Generally, these customers know what they're looking for. If you're trying alternative rock for the first time, it's probably worth it to group this music together. Most of it is not really suitable for instore play, but there are other things you can do to promote alternative women's music. For example, Tory Lane, music buyer at New Words Bookstore in Cambridge, Massachusetts, has had very good results by creating a separate section. She has taken packing material that resembles quilted paper bags, crumpled it and stuffed it around the area, and written the label "Riot Grrrl" in angry looking letters. This has been very successful, and the store seems to be reaching the younger crowd they have been trying to attract.



Here is a brief rundown of the alternative rock scene.

- The Breeders This band has become a staple on college and alternative radio. Led by Kim Deal and her sister Kelley, with Josephine Wiggs on bass and Jim MacPherson on drums, their songs are sometimes obscure but always listenable. Not much screaming here, in fact, some of it is distinctly reminiscent of 70s psychedelic rock.
- The Cranberries Lead singer Dolores O'Riordan has written or co-written most of the

songs from this Irish band. Some of the tunes make me think of the group The Story, but this is definitely a rock album. It's been getting a lot of media attention and is one of the more likely candidates for instore play.

- Ani DiFranco She calls it folk grunge. I call it amazing. This girl-with-attitude sings intense, literary, complex songs that penetrate the surface of social niceties and assumptions and bare the bones she finds underneath. She is raising an incredible buzz with her non-stop touring, prolific album releases, and talent. Her latest release, Out of Range, is selling like nothing I have seen before. Her fans are surfacing everywhere, and stores that have never displayed even mild interest in her are now scrambling to keep up with the demand. Stay tuned to this one.
- 4 Non-Blondes Wound up and ready to go, this 3-woman/1-man group does a mixture of punky-rock mixed with blues, ballads, and even a little funk. Their rock roots are visible, but they definitely have the "college radio" spin.
- L7 Punk rock, hard rock, almost grunge, but not a trace of ambivalence, this band muscles its way through songs that would wear out a lesser band. Heavy on the drums and churning guitars, they're in it with intensity. Though non-conformity is their stock in trade, they helped found "Rock For Choice," a group of pro-choice rock artists.
- Me'Shell NdegeOcello She's been getting a lot of attention from both the straight and gay press, and regardless of what you think of her "outness," (she has come out in various publications as bisexual, but seems annoyed by the media's constant craving) she's created a musically astonishing album. She is the first artist Madonna has produced on her own label. Smashing through the walls separating funk, hip-hop, R&B and jazz, she has created what she calls "Broken Hearted Revolutionary Love Songs." She writes, arranges, raps, sings, and plays most of the instruments.
- Liz Phair Her debut album, Exile in Guyville, is her response to the Stone's album Exile on Main

Street. She sings with no punches pulled about sex and men and the state of the world. Very popular on college radio, her style has been described as "power pop." Seeming to come out of nowhere on a relatively small label, she has garnered lots of attention, including being named to Best Album of the Year lists by the likes of *Spin Magazine*.

- Happy Rhodes She's been compared to Kate Bush and Annie Lennox, and some of her electronic experimenting combined with her vocal style make it an apt comparison. She delves into some fairly quirky realms with her music, and the aliens on the covers of her first several albums make them a bit unusual. Her latest release is actually a more acoustic rendering of some of her best tunes, showing yet another dimension of this talented performer.
- Jane Siberry Jane's been out there experimenting for years, using her ethereal voice to produce clever visions that occasionally leave her listeners in the dust. Jane has been recently profiled in *Rolling Stone*. She has produced a challenging but wonderful body of work. Listenable inventiveness.

Some more names to keep in mind as you build your section:

Tori Amos — Is this pop? Is this alternative? What is she talking about anyway?

Bikini Kill — scream a little scream with me...

Bjork — inventive solo debut by banshee vocalist of the Sugarcubes.


Bratmobile — "...simple, pretty '60s garagestyle pop songs stripped to the barest minimum...with the most foul-mouthed and bitter 22-year-old singer...you've ever heard." (Ladyslipper)

Diamanda Galas — opera of the damned, fueled by her rage at her brother's death from AIDS-related complications.

Tribe 8 — very in-yer-face radical dyke punk band from San Francisco.

Poetry Slams

The other trend we've been watching is the proliferation of poetry and spoken word tapes. This movement is directly related to the appearance of "poetry slams" in more and more towns (and some



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new book anthologies that have resulted from this emerging listener-oriented poetic).


Poetry is being reclaimed, after years of dwindling attention, by poets who are taking it to the streets rather than the library shelves. "Poetry Slams" are cropping up across the country, especially in larger cities. Poets perform their works with passion and most tackle subjects such as sexism, racism, and homophobia. There is even a quarterly newsletter (International Poetry Slam) and a yearly slam championship. Spoken word labels are cropping up in both the indie and the major label world — witness Gang of Seven, the spoken word label started by Windham Hill founder Will Ackerman (see FBN issue 17#1). Right now this trend seems to be regional but it appears to be spreading.

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
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
