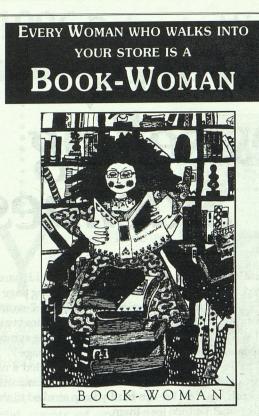
WaterSounds, **small indoor fountains** built for the sounds they make are beautiful and sound wonderful. They retail from \$75 to \$108. We sold six the first ten days! We couldn't believe it! She does a beautiful job. —Suzanne Unger

Two Sisters Bookshop/Menlo Park CA

A continued bestselling sideline for me is Little Blue Woman **hand-crafted candles**. Chloe has thirteen different ceremonial scent and color combinations. They are all hand-dipped and hand-poured into a wonderful teardrop shape in two sizes. She also has tapers.

**Brevans Boxes** are approximately 8"x10" boxes made of poplar wood with either a dark mahogany or a light oak stain. They have many cut-out designs as lid decorations, including moon and stars, coyote howling, dolphin, goddess, and triangle. Other designs also available. They retail for \$20. This is a lesbian-owned, two-woman operation. I sold five

It's so hard to pick just a few to write about, but here are some of our current favorite sidelines at Sisterspirit Bookstore:

One of our dedicated volunteers, Kelly McCoy, is also an artisan, and she has created Partners, a line of **funky**, **lesbian-image pins**. She handcolors each pin, and no two are exactly alike! The quality is high and her prices are reasonable. She also makes some very luxurious eye pillows — silk with 100% flax filling, nicely packaged. These products make nice gifts, and I highly recommend carrying them.

**Photo cards** from Singing Stones Studio are high quality cardstock with photographs on the front. Lots of very lesbian-positive and Goddess/spiritual photos available, and we're selling them for \$2.50 each.

Glass bead labrys earrings and necklaces from Amazon Earware: The earrings dangle from earhooks and the necklaces are strung on silk cord. They come in an assortment of colors and are packaged with a card explaining the meaning. \$10 retail for the earrings or the necklace. They make nice gifts or impulse purchases. See listing page 44.

Gay & Out Productions has recently come out with a line of **photo postcards** featuring African American lesbian images. Nice photos and an important product for a diverse clientele.

An ideal sideline takes up almost no room, enhances the bookstore environment, and doesn't break the bank with the initial outlay. Thus, I suggest **gay/lesbian laminated bookmarks** from Style Data. We've sold over 300 since we picked them up 16 months ago. They retail at \$1.25 to \$1.50 and come in the usual flavors (rainbow, red ribbon, double women's or men's symbol) with their own little stand free with a \$25 order. See ad page 21.

We ordered some **Rosie the Riveter T-shirts** from Watermind for Women's History Month, and I've been bowled over by the response. I've reordered

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twice in two months. Watermind also carries **Rosie the Riveter mugs**. See ad page 51.

And Not So Subtle Tees offers some great T-shirts, such as "Feminism: The Radical Notion that Women are People" and "Outrageous Older Woman." See ad page 52.

Hilary's Comfort Beads are one of our newest, favorite sidelines. The beads are handmade from smooth colored porcelain; they fit in the palm of your hand, and most have just the right groove for your thumb. There's a whole list of words you can have etched into them (abundance, courage, dream, breathe, blessed be, etc.) and Hilary also makes committment strands and serenity prayer strands (using "Goddess"!). See ad page 36.

My other favorite is K. Floyd's **Magnets and Pins**. They are a little pricey, but are selling well and are sweet, colorful and funny. They started doing a lesbian line just for us and are looking for other interested feminist businesses. "Gay But Moody" (my personal favorite — I wear the pin everywhere!), "We Are Family" (two women and a cat), and "Moon Child" are all very popular. See ad page 9.

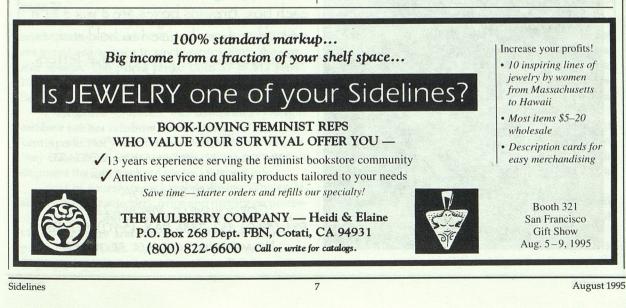

Many customers purchase multiple decks and use them as gift bookmarks or greeting card enclosures to friends and clients. Note cards and other items as well. See listing page 33.

Michigan is one of those states which only issues one license plate so we have to have **rainbow flag license plate** holders from Out Right Enterprises. We like plastic — it doesn't rust. See listing page 38.

Very unique **"Post a Story" cards and postcards** from Espresso Press: Each one is a short story in itself. Especially popular are the Goddess stories and the very nontraditional holiday cards. See ad page 26.

Our most popular calendar by far is the **Augustto-August Datebook** from Mixed Role Productions, Inc. No art, no clutter, just enough calendar space, charts, graphs and personal record space in a tidy spiral-bound format for even the most compulsive. (I speak from personal experience here.) 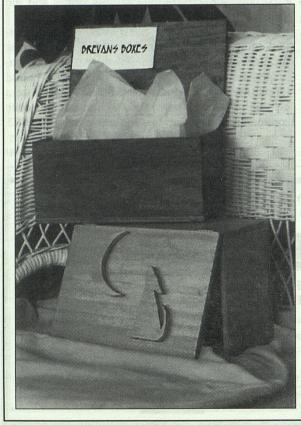

Each Glad Rag comes in three parts so that the thickness can be adjusted as needed. Many women want to use alternative products as a step towards personal and environmental health. Environmental awareness and recent media attention to the risks associated with dioxins in disposable tampons and pads has increased this interest in reusable menstrual products. 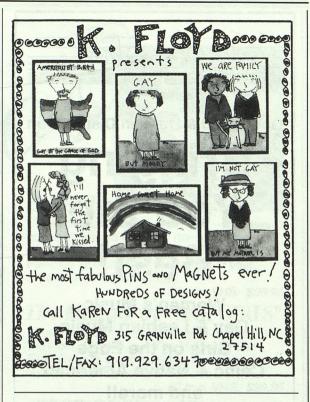

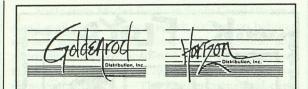

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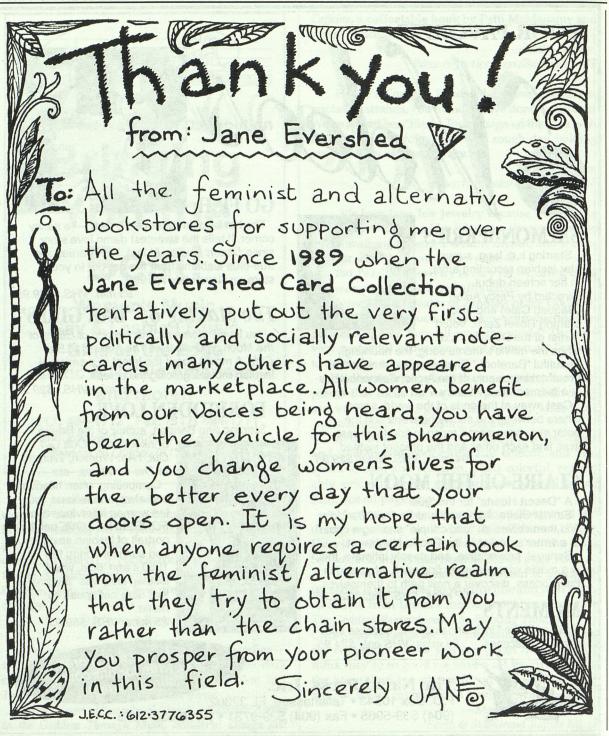

Card Care 101 TAKE THE QUIZ!

As feminists, we're well aware of the lack of positive imagery of women everywhere we turn. We blame the print media. We blame advertisers. We blame TV. And we certainly blame the consumerdriven mega-corporations. Where, we ask ourselves, are the images of women of color, of fat women, of young women, dykey-looking women, and just about every other kind of woman who's not white, longlegged, and draped in expensive looking clothing?

And yet, as feminist bookstore workers, many of us are guilty of perpetuating the same lack of imagery that we abhor. How, you ask, can it be so?

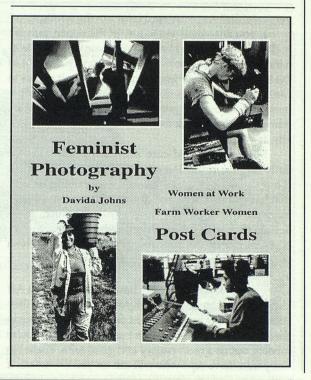
It's simple. In just about every feminist bookstore that I've ever entered, from California to New York and many points in between, the opportunity to display all kinds of wonderful imagery of women is lost. Imagery that could validate a woman's existence. Imagery that could make a woman laugh, or even cry. And imagery, quite frankly, that could be making you a profit, but is not.

The imagery I'm speaking of, if you haven't figured it out already, is the kind on postcards and notecards that could be filling your store. True, most women's bookstores do have card racks. I usually spot them first thing when I enter a store, and it'll be me who fusses over them, tidying them up, until my lover pulls me away hissing, "You're not working now!" But are your cards up to speed? There's one easy way to find out: take my simple test to see how your store rates in Card Care 101:

**1.** First, ponder your card racks. How many card racks does your store have? Did you know without looking? If you don't know how many racks your

store has, chances are they're neglected! A good number for small stores is probably one postcard rack and one notecard rack, with larger stores adding postcard racks first, then notecard racks. Postcards are cheaper, sell faster, and are a great impulse item.

**2.** Now go and have a look at the cards on your racks. Are your cards faded, dusty, or curling due to heat, sun, humidity or neglect? Are there empty pockets in your racks? Are horizontal images stuffed in





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vertical slots? Are stray cards stuck in the wrong slots?

If you answered yes to any of the above, you are guilty! Cards require almost daily maintenance. Neatness — which bookstore workers generally demand in the stacks — is sometimes forgotten when it comes to card care. Customers do not want to pick through a messy rack, or pay good money for cards that are damaged from the elements or from neglect. So usually, they just won't.

My regular card-care routine includes almost daily tidying, returning orphans to their proper slots, filling holes with fresh images, and pulling images that haven't sold well and dumping them into a bin of mark-downs. This I also maintain well, much to the delight of the postcard collectors who wander in especially to search through it every few days for fresh pickings at bargain prices.

**3.** Now, ask yourself if the names Fotofolio and Art Unlimited mean anything to you. If they don't, they should! They are two of the best-selling postcard lines in the country, and if you aren't carrying them, you're missing out on great imagery and great sales. These big companies have reps who will call on you for orders. If you are in a small town or cannot place big enough orders to justify a rep's time, find a larger bookstore willing to "piggy-back" your order on top of theirs, or work out some other alternative arrangement.

Other postcard lines great for women's bookstores are Pomegranate, which specializes in imagery of people of color, and Leeds, which is a British company with lots of wonderful lesbian and feminist postcards.

Notecards are more problematic. For one thing, there are hundreds, if not thousands, of manufactured lines available and probably just as many women at

home with their own cottage card-making industries. One of my favorites of the latter is the Oakland-based line Hannah's College Fund, which are beautiful hand made cards, adorned with charms and fabrics, that benefit a single mother's school fund for her young daughter. You may have to hunt around to find your first few hand made lines, then the rest will come to you, either through card reps, or through your front door.

Besides being able to buy up new things, it's also important to be able to say no. For example, in a hip big-city bookstore, '70s-style cards with line drawings of naked women on them do not sell at all. So I just won't buy them. If you have a more crunchy crowd, do buy a few. But be sure that's not all you buy, especially if you're in an urban center, or you'll risk alienating a huge potential market, especially among younger dykes, who find such imagery laughable at best. Better bets for bigger cities include the postcard lines mentioned above, and for notecards, try companies like Looking Out Productions, 10 Percent and Soho.

**4.** Now ask yourself: Who does the card buying and re-stocking at your store? Do you? Does anyone? Is it a hit-or-miss thing that happens once a year? Or are

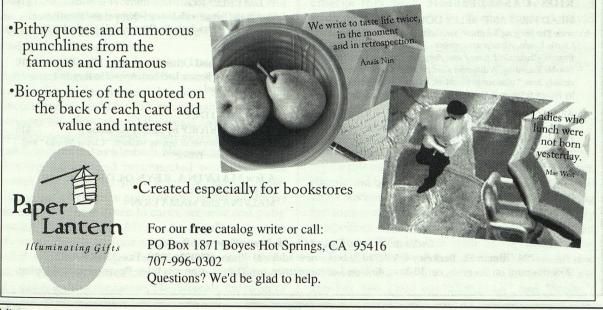
these tasks lovingly and carefully attended to by someone on your staff?

Cardbuying is an enjoyable and satisfying job for the right person. It's creative and also involves a fair bit of decision-making. If you are the owner or manager and just don't have the time, how about delegating it to someone else? It's a great way to get a less senior staff person or long-term part-timer more involved in the store. But it should be the job of someone who can do both the buying and the maintenance, so that both their interest and their card stock levels stay stable.

So, there you have it. Four questions that should give you a pretty good indication of where you and your cards are at. I don't know how many times I've walked into bookstores with beautiful and well stocked shelves, only to then find an abandoned, half empty card rack with droopy, faded images in it. Given the wide variety of wonderful imagery and card lines available today, not to mention the sales potential of this valuable sideline, there's really no excuse for this a moment longer!

ShapeShifters/Ubaka Hill. Superbly produced by Kay Gardner, this debut was born to be played in a bookstore. The Brooklyn-based Hill has come out with one seriously hip, smart drumming collection that will make all of us wonder what took us so long to discover the joys of percussion! Hill's commanding vocals mesh with an unstoppable, fierce and beautiful spirit sure to stop even the most jaded listener in their tracks. Hill gave a knockout performance this past May at the National Women's Music Festival, and will be a favorite (if you play her) with both World and Women's Music fans. \$5.99 tape, \$10.19 CD, Ladyslipper Records 116.

revenge/Janis Ian. Janis Ian has always been light-years ahead of the rest of the music industry. Best known for her controversial record, Society's Child (depicting an interracial relationship) and her monster hit, "Seventeen," the singer/songwriter has literally reinvented herself. Two years ago she very publicly came out as a lesbian, released the aptly titled Breaking Silence, and reconnected with, well, the world. Produced by John Jennings (Mary Chapin Carpenter's long-time guitarist and stellar producer) revenge is a more down to earth, acoustic and gutsy record than Breaking Silence. An excellent in-store choice — there's no tune too loud or rough, and it's filled with love songs. Take note, especially those stores that carry periodicals: Ian writes a column for the gay & lesbian magazine, The Advocate, the cover of which she graced this past June. \$6.10 tape, \$9.99 CD, Beacon Records 51559.

The Tide/Lucy Kaplansky. Kaplansky has one of the best voices in any current genre to date. She's been a backing vocalist for Suzanne Vega and Shawn Colvin, whose fans in particular will adore this record. In addition to producing Kaplansky's debut, Colvin is a long-time fan and collaborator. What's more, if you listen to Colvin after this record, it's obvious where she picked up her vocal style. She's admitted to being influenced by Kaplansky, but the similarities are nothing short of astounding. This is the best folk record to emerge this year. Standouts include Richard Thompson's "When I Get To the Border," David Massengill's "My Name Joe," and the title track written by the artist and her husband. It doesn't matter, because once you play this album in your store, customers will gravitate to it. Produced by folk connoisseur Eric Kibum, this second release is a strong, fluid record, covering a broader musical and lyrical range than their (much beloved) debut, So Strong. Point out to women's music customers that stellar vocalist Susan Herrick makes a guest appearance and most importantly that the duo covers Jaime Anderson's (previously unreleased) breast cancer anthem, "One Out of Three." Its not easy to pen clear, concise songs about such difficult issues with this kind of integrity, and Anderson has scored big time. Justina and Joyce do the song tremendous justice. Life Gets Real/Ann Reed. This is Reed's fourth and absolute best record to date. Acoustically, this record is a fabulous collection. 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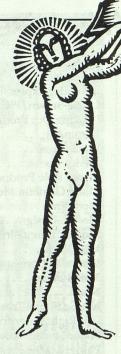
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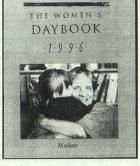
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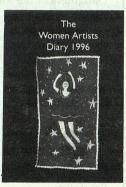
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# Inland Files Chapter 11 Bankruptcy/Reorganization

On August 1, Inland filed for Chapter 11 Bankruptcy/Reorganization after a long and difficult year of failing to regain its financial balance.

Reactions in the feminist book community ranged a certain zany elation (Naiad Press' "We are simply overjoyed by this news. It means they will become financially solvent again and will, by shedding much dead weight..., be able to move forward competitively in the tighter and tighter book market") to dismay, grief, and a various levels of panic as publishers try to plan their futures in light of the news and incomplete information and as booksellers (who were among the last to be officially notified) try to imagine how they will stock their stores with the new Fall titles from various publishers, for text book sales, and for holiday sales, and how they will get books from discontinued publishers.

As we go to press with this special supplement to the 1995 Sidelines Issue, many publishers are still making and re-making decisions about staying with Inland/InBook/WomanSource.

Initial information was terse and limited. Many publishers simply received a fax that stated that Inland had filed for reorganization under Chapter 11, that Inland had already taken steps to reorganize and return to profitable operation, and that it expected to continue operations without interruption; that under Bankruptcy Code creditors may not demand repayment of debt or interest owed to them as of the date of filing (but that the Code does allow for the timely payment of goods and services supplied *after* filing date); that official notice would be forthcoming from the bankruptcy court re a meeting of creditors and their right to file a proof of claim; and that Inland would undertake discussions with individual publishers concerning future business over the next several weeks.

Distributed publishers (InBook & most Woman-Source publishers?) seem to have received an additional letter stating that Inland intended to preserve as much of their distribution business as possible and that Inland would, subject to court approval, carry out the terms of their distribution agreements and expected distributed publishers to honor the terms of those agreements. It explained a little more about how Chapter 11 bankruptcy works, explained that since most distributed publishers' payments are not in arrears, Inland should be able to resume making timely payments fairly quickly to those publishers Inland wished to continue distributing, and outlined a bit of Inland's goal of "working diligently over the next several months to strengthen our ability to continue as your distributors and we continue to be confident that we will be more focused and more effective in selling your books than ever before." It also named Inland's counsel (James Berman, Zeisler & Zeisler, 203-368-4234).

Other publishers remain committed to staying at Inland and to keeping books in stock.

### A New Plan: Focusing on Distribution

Interviews with David Wilk over the next two weeks clarified some of Inland's hopes and goals for the Chapter 11 reorganization: The current vision is

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for Inland to continue to exist, primarily as a distributor for a group of publishers that aren't currently being served by other distributors — certain gay, feminist, political and literary publishers — and to continue with some of the (profitable) aspects of the wholesale book and magazine operation that round out that niche. The focus will be on sales and marketing, rather than on access.

Pre-filing Inland distributed books for about 1500 publishers. Inland will clearly cut the number of publishers significantly — possibly by 60% or more. Attention would shift to the most saleable books and unprofitable titles would, necessarily, be cut. David Wilk sees that Inland will "make a stand for feminist, outpost, poetry, and other books" that address Inland's specific niche. Afer Christmas Inland will take stock, make further plans and try to attract publishers back, but the goal is to be a smaller company. Chapter 11 is a way to shrink a company hard and fast. The motto through this period is "Do the least harm."

Central to Inland's vision of its future is keeping the InBook distribution program intact, keeping some (or most?) WomanSource publishers on the distribution program, as well as keeping a (small?) number of key or profitable wholesale publishers (such as Naiad), calendars and magazines.

Another vital part of the plan, for all the polite and legal language that exists to make it sound nicer, is to dump debt from publishers whose lines aren't profitable for Inland and to cease carrying their products.

Having filed for Chapter 11, Inland's financial activities will be closely supervised by the court. Inland will also be required to file a plan for reorganization in October or November.

#### The Math

That Inland is in financial trouble is not news.

Last summer, after attempting to sell Inland to generate operating capital and being bilked by bustout artist John Miller (watch for the story in the next FBN about Miller's plea bargain, which acknowledges buying 17 companies — including Inland — with intent to defraud), Inland went public with its financial problems, tried to recapitalize based on creditor loans and to reorganize. That Inland was having financial problems was not news to those publishers with whom Inland was in serious arrears and had been the heart of discussion at the ABA that spring. Inland currently owes approximately \$5 million. It's assets are estimated at \$3-3.5 million. About \$1.3 million of the debt is "secured" and thus should, under bankruptcy law, be paid. (Last summer fifty-some publishers secured their Inland debts by performing some act of benevolence such as loaning back a portion of last summers' debt or forgiving certain portions of it altogether.) The remaining \$3.5 million of the debt is not secured and those publishers will probably receive some low percentage of compensation.

Where did the debt come from? Miller cost Inland an estimated \$250,000 to \$300,000 between what he walked out with and the consequent expenses. Inland also claims an additional \$250,000 in bad debt from store closings in the last 18 months. (At Inland's 24% discount, the store closings would eat all the markup for \$1 million in sales; the John Miller, another \$1 million ... without paying anything toward the cost of doing that \$2 million of business.) Inland also misjudged the music market for independent bookstores and invested heavily in catalogs and marketing music that didn't pay off and invested in other programs that lost, rather than made, money. Old problems also included creating a plan that grew the company too fast without creating an adequate infrastructure to sustain the larger staff and business load or evaluate the effects of the growth.

Inland's 1994-95 recovery plan ran into a number of serious problems: It presumed that sales would remain steady when, in fact, and in part a result of having fewer titles on hand when needed, sales declined. Returns, rather than remaining steady or declining, skyrocketed at Inland as they have all across the book industry, complicated perhaps, by booksellers' concern that if books were not returned now (while Inland was intact), stores would never be able to return them. Returns, since they involve both sending the books out and processing them back in while generating no income at all, are extremely expensive for any distributor. Fewer publishers were willing and able to offer Inland extended terms than Inland's plan had hoped. Shrinking a business, like growing a business, is also expensive. Books from discontinued publishers must be packed up and returned, accounts must be balanced out and debt must be agreed on if not paid off.

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Inland has, over the last 27 months, distributed \$25 million to publishers.

### Can It Work?

Many wonder if there's reason to believe that Inland can survive Chapter 11 reorganization when so many companies that file for Chapter 11 end up being liquidated under Chapter 7 — and when Inland has already tried, over the last year, to implement many of the changes that would make the difference.

The biggest — and ugliest — difference is that under Chapter 11 Inland simply doesn't pay most of the publishers most of what they are owed and, under Bankruptcy Code, pays current (post August 1) bills only. This is a state that Inland tried to achieve on a voluntary basis last summer.

Inland has also cut staff by 60% over the last 18 months.

But other problems remain: Sales and customer service, despite the addition of reps, has never returned to the partnership and team levels that characterized Inland's pre-distribution days and generated such strong customer loyalty and support. Granted FBN always hears dissatisfaction rather than success stories when it comes to collections departments, but Inland seems not to have solved its problems on this side, either.

And then there are a number of larger questions:

1) Inland's genius has been wholesaling: collecting and making (readily and dependably available) a *wide* range of books that were available nowhere else.

2) Distribution, as evidenced by a migration pattern of publishers out of InBook and on to PGW and Consortium, has never been what Inland does best. Presumably the point of focusing on distribution is that it's more profitable, if also more expensive.

3) If Inland's distribution has been shored up by booksellers' Monday morning Inland wholesale orders, how will it fare without that impetus?

4) The goal is to provide distribution to publishers that won't find it elsewhere. But many feminist bookstores are questioning whether distribution, which means a lower net profit for publishers and higher returns from sales to stores that aren't committed to the publishers' books, solves or creates problems for publishers that were successfully wholesaled in years past. Distribution, as it is currently being practiced across the country, also tends to shift sales to publishers' frontlist (which necessarily varies in strength from season to season) and away from the more stable backlist, a practice that also blurs the distinction between chain and specialty stores.

5) For the stores committed to carrying books of the kind sold by the publishers InBook seeks to (continue to) distribute, distribution (versus wholesaling) books is of very little practical value, but it does increase the number of (competitor) stores carrying the frontlist titles and the cream of the backlist. I, for one, would like to see a crystal-ball report that balances the profit gained by publishers via the active promotion of their frontlist titles to stores that wouldn't otherwise buy them against 1) the cost of returns from these same stores and 2) the loss of outlets and support for their backlist if (when) the committed stores lose the battles against the chains and increased competition from independents trying to survive the chains by moving into increased specialty (gay/les/fem) areas as a survival strategy rather than out of ongoing commitment to the titles and publishers.

In other words, is distribution slitting our own throats as booksellers and publishers?

#### **Generating Animosity**

Regardless of other long-term outcomes of Inland's Chapter 11, it divides feminist publishers into two groups: those who (are going to) get paid and those who aren't. Clearly the former group benefits by the losses of the latter group whether it's admitted or not, and this is undoubtedly going to create a certain level of animosity among publishers and will make it very difficult for publishers on opposite sides of the divide to work together toward common goals.

The rallying cry "Pay Inland so Inland can pay publishers" also creates a similar problem for the bookstores. What this cry means, of course, is pay Inland so Inland can survive and pay certain publishers what they are due, and so that Inland can pay other, equally beloved and important publishers, a small number of cents on the dollars they are owed or absolutely nothing at all. Many, quite accurately, see payment of debt owed to Inland as an investment essential to Inland's continued existence. Booksellers, unfortunately, have no control over who gets paid with the money they owe to Inland. Nor will feminist publishers be able to have much impact.

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## The Creditors Committee

In bankruptcy proceedings, the twenty largest unsecured creditors are invited to meet as a committee to negotiate in the interest of the (largest) creditors. Most of the creditors on the committee will be owed upwards of \$30,000. Ironically, there are no feminist or gay-owned publishers in the top twenty to negotiate a more fair settlement for the smaller publishers as the largest feminist publishers who might otherwise be in the top twenty are either InBook publishers (and thus are relatively current with their Inland receivables) and/or because they secured their debt last summer. Publishers who are likely to be on the creditors group include Heinemann, Fromm, Chronicle Books, Masquerade, and Consortium. This group is scheduled to meet on September 27. FBN's experience, having had a number of advertisers declare bankruptcy over the years, is that, as a small creditor, we've never received even a penny on the dollar - nor have we ever received a report on what the larger creditors received. We would like this bankruptcy proceeding to be a little more equitable.

## The Importance of InBook this Fall

Regardless of whether Inland manages to reorganize and survive into the future, Inland's decision to continue operating through the Fall and Spring seasons was absolutely the right decision if the continued survival of the presses is seen as the priority. A much-worse-case-scenario would have been for Inland to simply file for Chapter 7 (liquidation) on August 1. That would have left a host of publishers with no way to distribute and sell their Fall lists - a situation that would certainly have caused many more publishers to collapse very suddenly and a scenario that is much more devastating even than the reality we are facing. Whether Inland survives past next Spring or not, the fact that it is here now to sell (and to pay for) Fall and Spring titles from Inland-dependent publishers means that these publishers (if not all publishers) have time to negotiate other alternatives. It is the wise choice in an untenable situation.

## What Will Bookstores Do?

What bookstores do depends, primarily, on what the publishers decide. Obviously, as publishers are discontinued or as they withdraw their books from Inland, bookstores will have to shift their ordering patterns. In some cases this will mean increased orders to publishers' primary distributors (i.e., Consortium or PGW — which does maintain a frontlist warehouse in the East) and/or paying shipping from Bookpeople. Sometimes it will mean increased orders to B&T or (ouch!) Ingram (the chainstore of distributors). Many books may "disappear" for a while as bookstores try to find publishers' addresses or other distributors for these books (a situation that will add further burden to publishers who arealreadysuffering from their Inland related losses). Some titles will be direct ordered and some will be dropped as it is impossible for stores to order from so many publishers.

Some publishers may also request the bookstores do a direct order for their initial stock order.

## Finding the Publishers; Finding the Bookstores

It's a given that Inland will stock fewer books from fewer publishers than in the past. One of the things Inland can do to ease this transition and reduce the damage done to the bookselling and alternate publishing communities is to provide booksellers with the addresses of discontinued publishers when the stores attempt to order these books, so that bookstores that wish to can pursue direct orders. Bookstores would also be well served if Inland would make customer lists available to publishers (perhaps in part compensation for moneys owed that will never be paid?) so that publishers can find their customers and advise them of changes in distribution and/or direct order terms.

When Women In Distribution closed fifteen years ago, FBN published the names and addresses of all of WIND's publishers along with terms and other distributors used. Given the changes in technology, there ought to be another, equally simple and economical way of providing the information to reopen communication between the publishers who lose big in the Inland bankruptcy and the bookstores who are their primary customers. It's essential for the publishers' survival and it's certainly essential for the bookstores. Inland's mailing list is big, but direct mail blitzes should be viable if several publishers join together to share the expense.

FBN will also be publishing updated distribution information as we receive it from the publishers. O

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
